Berlin—September, 1945. Two manuscripts are found in rubble, each one narrating conflicting versions of the life of an Irish spy during the war. One of them is the journal of a German military intelligence officer and an anti-Nazi cowed into silence named Adrian de Groot, charting his relationship with his agent, friend, and sometimes lover, an Irishman named Frank Pike. In De Groot's narrative, Pike is a charismatic IRA fighter sprung from prison in Spain to assist with the planned German invasion of Britain, but who never gets the chance to consummate his deal with the devil. Meanwhile, the other manuscript gives a very different account of the Irishman's doings in the Reich. Assuming the alter ego of the Celtic hero Finn McCool, Pike appears here as the ultimate Allied saboteur. His mission: an assassination campaign of high-ranking Nazi doctors, culminating in the killing of Hitler's personal physician. The two manuscripts spiral around each other, leaving only the reader to know the full truth of Pike and De Groot's relationship, their ultimate loyalties, and their efforts to resist the fascist reality in which they are caught.

[Soundies and the Changing Image of Black Americans on Screen](#) - Susan Delson 2021-12-07

In the 1940s, folks at bars and restaurants would gather around a Panoram movie machine to watch three-minute films called Soundies, precursors to today's music videos. In *Soundies and the Changing Image of Black Americans on Screen: One Dime at a Time*, Susan Delson takes a deeper look at these fascinating films by focusing on the role of Black performers in this little-known genre. Using previously unknown archival materials—including letters, corporate memos, and courtroom testimony—to trace the precarious path of Soundies, Delson presents an incisive pop-culture snapshot of race relations during and just after World War II. More than anything else, these stories are about relationships, mostly private ones: wives and husbands (and "exes"), parents and children, siblings, intimate friends, and courtship partners (that is, people in the process of becoming intimate). A second large grouping has to do with larger social issues: class issues, political issues and international relations, health care, women's issues (which, here, often arise from male-female relationships), aging and age-related diseases, and the relationship of the individual to any person or organization outside the self ('society' writ large). Also included here are healthy doses of genre fiction: science fiction, tales of the supernatural, seduction and personal betrayal, art and creativity-and murder." The Darktown Ladies' Story-Book and Gun Club is a frame story collection in the tradition of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales: By the conclusion, the narrative that frames this collection of stories and the characters of individual authors may be of as of much interest and importance as the stories themselves.

After tremendous success with their first effort, the Darktown Ladies Book & Gun Club have published again! This second frame story collection of Darktown stories was mentored and edited by the late Mary Jo Newland, Professor of Creative Writing at Penn-Franklin Junior College. Although these stories are as various in subject matter as those in the first collection, this assortment has a much more somber tone than the first,

appropriately reflecting the circumstances of Mary Jo's gruesome murder. In addition to an introduction by the famous writer George Badget (who also contributes a story), there are contributions by Darktown Ladies

serving time for murder, an excerpt (called here "The Secret Sharer") from best-selling author Bob Johnson's forthcoming autobiographical novel Johnson's Life of Johnson, and an opening story ("My Stalker") by the late Professor Newland herself.
