Many years before Brigitte Bardot and Catherine Deneuve rose to fame, the French cinema produced a host of glamorous female stars designed to rival their Hollywood counterparts. Bathed in soft light, discussed adoringly in fan magazines and shown wearing the latest fashions, these 'cinematic stars' emerged in opposition to France's traditional stage-based stardom, while remaining, through the roles they played

and the looks they sported, a distinctly French phenomenon. The French Screen Goddess examines how these stars influenced the narratives and look of their films, contributed to defining the period's new, emancipated femininity -, the 'modern woman' -, and related to the decade's politics, particularly the Popular Front of the mid-1930s. The book focuses on the three most important examples of this type of stardom, Annabella, Danielle Darrieux and Michele Morgan, while also considering many other key stars, such as Arletty, Viviane Romance and Jean Gabin. Previously neglected films are considered and true classics of French cinema re-examined, with Rene Clair's *Quatorze juillet*, Julien Duvivier's *La Bandera*, and Marcel Carne's *Le Quai des brumes* and *Hotel du Nord* foremost among these.

Two Stories/Deux nouvelles - Stendhal 2014-05-05

In writing these two ardently romantic and turbulent tales, Stendhal delved deep into old Italian narratives and into his own impassioned heart. "Vanina Vanini" and "L'abbesse de Castro" abound in the qualities for which the French author remains enduringly popular: his strong-willed, impulsive characters; his dry wit and keen irony; and the sweeping drama of his historical settings. Originally published in the *Revue de Paris* in 1829, "Vanina Vanini" traces the fortunes of an aristocrat's daughter who falls in love with a wounded soldier, and prefigures Stendhal's superb novel, *The Red and the Black*, which appeared two years later.

"L'abbesse de Castro," published in 1839 under a pseudonym in the prestigious *Revue des Deux Mondes*, was reputedly derived from Roman and Florentine source manuscripts. Consisting chiefly of Stendhal's own invention, it recounts the illicit liaison and subsequent trial of an abbess. The only dual-language edition of these stories, this book features an informative introduction and ample footnotes, making it not only a pleasure to read but also a valuable learning and teaching aid for students and teachers of French literature.

Bazin's impact on film art, as theorist and critic, is considered to be greater than that of any single director, actor, or producer. He is credited with almost single-handedly establishing the study of film as an accepted intellectual pursuit, as well as with being the spiritual father of the French New Wave. *Bazin at Work* is the first English collection of disparate Bazin writings since the appearance of the second volume of *What Is Cinema?* in 1971. It includes work from *Cahiers le cinema* (which he founded and which is the most influential single critical periodical in the history of the cinema) and *Esprit*. He addresses filmmakers including Rossellini, Eisenstein, Pagnol, and Capra and well-known films including *La Strada*, *Citizen Kane*, *Scarface*, and *The Bridge on the River Kwai*.
