Una sera d'estate del 1605, nel cuore della Roma papalina, un uomo di legge viene aggredito alle spalle nel buio, e ferito gravemente con un colpo di spada. Interrogato, l'uomo dichiara di non avere dubbi: a colpirlo è stato Michelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio, il «pittor celebre» con cui qualche sera prima aveva avuto un violento alterco a proposito di una donna chiamata «Lena, che è donna di Michelangelo». Nella vicenda del Caravaggio, pur caratterizzata da continue turbolenze, l'episodio era fino ad oggi rimasto anomalo, sproporzionato, indecifrabile. Chi era Lena? Di cosa era stata incolpata? E perché Caravaggio si era schierato a sua difesa, con un comportamento così violento e scellerato? Per secoli una documentazione scarna e reticente aveva impedito di trovare risposte che andassero oltre le più fantasiose congetture. Finalmente, questo libro scioglie ad uno ad uno i nodi di quella trama oscura, attraverso un'indagine storica rigorosa, costruita su un potente apparato di documenti, in larga parte inediti e qui integralmente trascritti, che porta a una serie successiva di disvelamenti. Il primo passo è l'identificazione di Lena nella persona di Maddalena Antognetti, cortigiana di rango, al centro di una complessa rete di relazioni trasversali negli ambienti più in vista della Roma del tempo. Il secondo passo ci porta nel cuore del libro. Una volta identificata la «Lena, donna di Michelangelo», prende forma un lungo e appassionante flashback che ne racconta tutta la vita precedente, in una ricostruzione ispirata esplicitamente al metodo della «microstoria». Da figlia di una famiglia agiata di un mercante ben introdotto negli ambienti della curia papale, a adolescente orfana e diseredata,

costretta con la madre e la sorella maggiore, Amabilia, a lasciare la casa paterna. Ed è proprio Amabilia a spingere Maddalena sulla strada della prostituzione. La vicenda delle due sorelle cortigiane si dipana da quel momento in un crescendo turbolento di affetti e gelosie, solidarietà e contrasti. Da oscura comprimaria, Maddalena Antognetti prende la scena e diventa protagonista di una ricostruzione storica di una città – e di un mondo – dominati dalla violenza e dalla sopraffazione del potere, rigorosamente maschile. È a questa Roma, colta e violenta, raffinata e corrotta, libertina e poliziesca, che Maddalena presta il suo sguardo femminile e scandaloso. Su questo scenario, ed è il terzo passo del libro, prende corpo un'altra certezza. È proprio Maddalena a far da modella al Caravaggio, prestando il suo sembiante al volto della Vergine in un dipinto cruciale dell'artista, quella Madonna dei pellegrini che, esposta al pubblico qualche mese prima su un altare della chiesa di Sant'Agostino, aveva suscitato «estremo schiamazzo» tra i «popolani». Quel quadro non era stato il primo, né sarebbe stato l'ultimo. Nel giro di sette anni, furono almeno sette i grandi quadri di soggetto religioso nei quali Michelangelo ritrasse la cortigiana Maddalena nelle vesti impegnative di sante e di madonne. E in tutte e sette – come mostra la densa postfazione di Fiora Bellini, che fa da vero e proprio contrappunto artistico alla narrazione del libro – campeggia quel volto seducente, ritratto «dal naturale», che chiunque, a Roma, avrebbe facilmente potuto riconoscere. Su questa cifra di profonda, umana condivisione, si salda l'incontro tra Maddalena e Michelangelo, solidali nel difendere, ciascuno a suo modo, la propria identità, il proprio mestiere, la propria reputazione. Fino in fondo. A costo dello sfregio.

Excellences & Perfections - Amalia Ulman 2018

This book presents the fiercely intelligent internet-based performance of artist Amalia Ulman, which she eventually revealed to be a critical artwork about issues of online identity. Amalia Ulman's performance "Excellences & Perfections", which unfolded on Instagram in 2014, follows an aspiring it-girl who undergoes a series of cosmetic surgeries and lifestyle changes to help jumpstart her career. For six months Ulman mesmerized her followers with nearly daily posts that documented a young woman trying on different personas in order to make her way in the world. Finally, the real Amalia Ulman revealed the fiction that she had created--a performance piece about identity, gender, class, sexuality, and lifestyle porn. The illustrations are presented in chronological order to give readers the experience of viewing the work as an uninterrupted stream, in the way her followers first saw them on social media. A forerunner of a new brand of performance art, Ulman has made a significant statement about the intersection of life and art--one that couldn't be more timely or compelling.

Palazzo Strozzi hosts an extraordinary exhibition dedicated to Florentine art of the latter 1500s, the last act of a trilogy dedicated to 16th-century art in Florence, which began with Bronzino in 2010 and Pontormo and Rosso Fiorentino in 2014. The Cinquecento in Florence, confronts the development of Florentine art in the second half of the century through paintings and sculptures by artists including Andrea del Sarto, Bronzino, Pontormo, Giorgio Vasari, Giambologna, Bartolomeo Ammannati and Santi di Tito. The exhibition, and this accompanying catalogue, also provides the opportunity to restore important works of art and to construct a wide network of collaboration between museums, cultural institutions and Florentine and Tuscan sites. The result is a celebration of an exceptional cultural epoch of intellectual inspiration marked by the Council of Trent during the Counter-Reformation, and by Francesco I de'Medici, one of the most brilliant representatives of courtly patronage in Europe.

Displacing Caravaggio - Francesco Zucconi 2018-10-17

This book takes its start from a series of attempts to use Caravaggio's works for contemporary humanitarian communications. How did his *Sleeping Cupid* (1608) end up on the island of Lampedusa, at the heart of the Mediterranean migrant crisis? And why was his painting *The Seven Works of Mercy* (1607) requested for display at a number of humanitarian public events? After critical reflection on these significant transfers of Caravaggio's work, Francesco Zucconi takes Baroque art as a point of departure to guide readers through some of the most haunting and compelling images of our time. Graffiti and Street Art - Konstantinos Avramidis 2016-12-08

Graffiti and street art images are ubiquitous, and they enjoy a very special place in collective imaginary due to their ambiguous nature. Sometimes enigmatic in meaning, often stylistically crude and aesthetically aggressive, yet always visually arresting, they fill our field of vision with texts and images that no one can escape. History of the Restoration and Conservation of Works of Art - Alessandro Conti 2016-01-20

At times controversial and uncompromising, always intellectually honest, Alessandro Conti's book is - astonishingly - the only attempt to comprehensively chart in time, the changing impact of man's desire to

preserve for future generations the materials, meaning and appearances of works of art. Remarkable in its meticulous research of source material and breadth of scope, *History of the Restoration and Conservation of Works of Arts*, translated by Helen Glanville, charts the practices and underlying philosophies of conservation and 'restored' works of art from the Middle Ages to the end of the nineteenth century. In English-speaking countries, a lack of foreign language skills leaves many unable to consult a wealth of both published and unpublished historical documentation. Developments in conservation have therefore tended toward the scientific and analytical. Access to such documentation leads to better understanding of the present appearance of works of art and of their changing aspect and perception over time. Recent publications indicate that there is a great need for people writing on the subject to be aware of material which is not in their mother tongue: approaches presented as 'new' are in fact merely 'contemporary', and have been discussed or practiced in other centuries and countries. Just as knowledge of practices and effects of art conservation and restoration should form an integral part of History of Art Degrees, the more theoretic, abstract and historical aspects, should also be part of the training. This book is an invaluable source for academic and public institutions, art historians as well as practicing conservators and lovers of art.

Domingo Milella - Domingo Milella 2015-02-28

"It's hard to talk about photography without facing issues of time, memory and death - not as stereotypical archetypes, but as challenging and malleable entities of culture and nature." Domingo Milella This first published monograph by Domingo Milella is a photographic journey from his hometown in the outskirts of Bari in southern Italy, taking us to Mexico City, Cairo, Ankara, Anatolia, Sicily, Tunisia, and as far as Mesopotamia. Milella's subject is cities and their borders, cemeteries and villages, caves and homes, tombs and hieroglyphs - in short, signs of man's presence on earth. of the past is to face the present, and activate the possibility of the future."

O Futuro Certo - Guy Tillim 2015

Co-published by The Walther Collection, this book presents selections from Guy Tillim's most influential works and series of the last decade, including *Mai Mai* militia in training, *Joburg*, *Avenue Patrice Lumumba*, and *Second Nature*. Anchored in photojournalism but working against the grain of spectacle, Tillim portrays the communities, social landscapes and symbolic structures of societies altered by conflict. From explorations of modernist architecture and its utopian ruins in post-colonial Angola, Congo and Mozambique, to the homes and private lives of Johannesburg's inner-city residents, Tillim's work raises timely questions about the politics and representation of the built environment.

Kuniyoshi - Rossella Menegazzo 2018-10-04

Recognized as one of the most interesting and vibrant artists from the Edo period, Utagawa Kuniyoshi (1797-1861) is a major exponent of ukiyo-e in the early 1800s and trained under the master Utagawa Toyokuni. His fame is tied to the series of polychrome xylographs that illustrate the 108 heroes from the novel *Suikoden* (Brigands), which became a bestseller in China and Japan in the late 1700s, promoting the imagery of a band of brigands who defend the people suppressed by injustice and government corruption. Violent, powerful, armed people with muscular bodies covered in tattoos that today inspire manga, anime, tattoo artists and illustrators across the world. Kuniyoshi affirmed the genre of warrior prints, but he was also interested in portraits of female beauties, kabuki actors, landscapes, children and ghosts, another greatly admired genre in Japan. Nonetheless, his name is above all associated with illusion, with shadows and Arcimboldo-like composite figures, figures within figures and parodies of stories and battles with animals, objects, sweets, food. His images are fantastical, baroque, rich in colour, of great detail, with imposing characters and dynamic actions. A versatile and intriguing figure for the variety of subjects, from female beauties and monsters to animals and heroes, and for the impressive technique that gave life to a school carried forth for generations.

Michelangelo Merisi Da Caravaggio - the Paintings - 2017-08-28

After Caravaggio - Michael Fried 2016

A revelatory study of a school of remarkable painters from one of the great art historians of the 20th century. During the twenty years following Caravaggio's death, his revolutionary precedent inspired the creation of a remarkable body of paintings. Drawing together works by Bartolomeo Manfredi, Valentin de Boulogne, Nicolas

Tournier, Nicolas Regnier, Cecco del Caravaggio, and the young Jusepe de Ribera, Michael Fried examines the nature of this later generation's engagement with Caravaggio. The magnitude and interest of their achievements have long been recognized, but existing scholarship has touched only the surface. Fried approaches his topic with seriousness and sophistication, revealing the density of meaning and sheer pictorial ambition in the works of the painters known as the Caravaggisti. Accessibly written, this beautifully illustrated book combines an account of works by Manfredi, Valentin, Tournier, Regnier, and Ribera with a detailed case study of Cecco del Caravaggio's *Resurrection* (1619-20), and concludes by surveying a group of paintings by Guercino, a painter not counted among the Caravaggisti, but whose strategies in relation to the viewer aligned him with their interests. Fried moves with agility between broad and focused fields of vision. In his final remarks, he makes a compelling case for understanding these paintings in relation to the thought of René Descartes.

In Between - Guy Bourdin 2010

Guy Bourdin's vivid, narrative-infused work placed him at the vanguard of fashion photography for a career that spanned four decades. *In Between* demonstrates Guy Bourdin's unique conceptual and formal engagement with the double-page spread as an art form in itself. This concept appeared in his first published image for *French Vogue* (1955), a photograph of a model with a Haute Couture Dior hat captured alongside an array of butchered cow heads. This visual, a signature piece emblematic of the classic elements of Guy Bourdin's entire oeuvre, stands firmly as one of the most daring fashion images of the 20th century. Guy Bourdin's double page spread became a landmark in the history of advertising photography. His compositions gave new form to ideas about product-illustration creating independently arresting images that invited the reader to participate or witness. Guy Bourdin was both the narrator of a fantastic *mise en scene* as well as the choreographer of the magazine page, garnering all the more attention for his advertising clients such as Charles Jourdan. With 300 images, *In Between* re-assembles many of the original image layouts as they were published in magazines such as *French Vogue*, *British Vogue*, *Vogue Italy*, *Harpers Bazaar*, *Linea Italiana* and *The Best*, offering a new and illuminating critical context to the creative process. Guy Bourdin tailored his compositions to the constraints of the printed page both conceptually and graphically, and the mirror motif so central in his work finds its formal counterpart in the doubleness of the magazine spread. Layout and design become powerful metaphors for the photographic medium, engaging the eye and with it, the mind. Published by Steidl/dangin, *In Between* was conceived and edited by Shelly Verthime, whose unflagging devotion and nearly 10 years of research has resulted in an unparalleled grasp of the photographer's oeuvre. The monograph is introduced by Charlie Scheips, whose knowledge and passion for art, fashion and photography

as well as the history of magazine publishing, brings a new perspective to this enduring body of work. Guy Bourdin (1928-1991) was born in Paris. A painter his entire life and a self-taught photographer, he exhibited his first photographs at Galerie 29 in 1952. His work has been exhibited in the most prestigious museums, such as The Victoria & Albert Museum, the Jeu de Paume, The National Art Museum of China, The Tokyo Metropolitan Museum of Photography and The Moscow House of Photography.

How basketball has furnished art with motifs, politics and more from pop art to contemporary portraiture From David Hammons' Higher Goals and Robert Indiana's Mecca Floor to the more recent works of Nina Chanel Abney and Titus Kaphar, basketball has proven an especially popular sport in art, whether in the depiction of players, or more abstract deployments of motifs, as in Barkley Hendricks, or as a means of treating themes of social inequality and political justice. Gathering work by more than 100 artists from the 20th century to now, this volume reveals a little-discussed point of overlap between art and sport, in part to be found in the titular phrase "common practice"--"practice" in the sense of "to perform an activity or exercise regularly in order to improve or maintain one's proficiency." This book argues that the need to rehearse, discover and explore through the act of doing makes these two very different ideas of perfecting one's craft very similar. Picasso - Anna Coliva 2019-08-31

* Picasso's contribution to the revitalization of modern sculpture cannot be underestimated. His work of over fifty years is examined in seven essays and illustrated by more than 50 exhibited works* First published to accompany an exhibition in Rome, at Galleria Borghese that took place in early 2019 In 1917 Pablo Picasso traveled to Rome and Naples with Jean Cocteau and Igor Stravinskij. During this trip, for the first time, he could admire directly Hellenistic and Roman sculpture, that of the Renaissance and Baroque eras, but also the Roman frescoes of Pompeii. The first exhibition dedicated to Picasso's sculpture to be held in Rome, and

its accompanying catalogue, were conceived as a journey through the centuries that chronologically follows the interpretation of forms and different themes - stories and myths, bodies and figures, objects and fragments - in sculpture. The exhibition of masterpieces of the great Spanish master is accompanied by previously unpublished images of his sculpture studios (by Edward Quinn) that narrate the context in which these works were born. The catalogue includes essays that explore the visual and conceptual dialogue between the works of Picasso and works of the past, illustrating and examining over fifty works, some of which have never been exhibited before.

The Architecture of Pica Ciamarra Associati - Antonietta Iolanda Lima 2019-04

Since 1970, based in an isolated building situated on the peninsula of Posillipo, Pica Ciamarra Associati (www.picaint.eu) has acted as a laboratory of architectural and urban design which has gradually incorporated new members and new energies over the time: using a multidisciplinary approach, the roots of the architectural practice lie in the intensive theoretical and practical work begun in the early 1960s by Massimo Pica Ciamarra. Since then the practice has been marked by a continuous relationship with Le Carré Bleu Feuille internationale d'architecture and leading members of the cultural milieu of Team 10: this has led to constant attention to everything that lies beyond form, to the relationship with contexts that also include non-spatial contexts, and to high levels of integration and dialectical discussion. According to Pica Ciamarra Associati, a design transcends the approaches of a single sector, providing simultaneous solutions to contradictory requirements, combining utopia and practicality. The poetics of the fragment: it mediates between architecture and the urban dimension; some designs also have the aim of becoming absorbed within a context as 'informed fragments'. This monograph is the result of an intensive period of work and consists of two interacting parts. It stems from research into the archive of the studio Pica Ciamarra and conversation with the members of the architectural practice. Organised diachronically, the book tells the long story, unfolding over a period of over fifty years of a team of Neapolitan architects and designers, who have maintained the lively spirit of the practice which is still geared towards the future. The textual and iconographic account tells a story and offers an interpretation that highlights the vibrant atmosphere of the studio, based on a consistency of thought and action, and fuelled by an interest in many different forms of knowledge. The contextualisation of the events related to the studio, as they unfolded over time, is wide-ranging, coherent and connotative. Antonietta Iolanda Lima, professor of history of architecture at the University of Palermo, has always tried, through theory, teaching and design, to disseminate the importance

of history which can embracing innovation and tradition to an equal degree, forming a new architectural language. According to her view of architecture, history and design are closely connected, a 'single entity' as is reflected by her career. Since the 1980s, her academic work has gained increasing importance, a way of avoiding narrow sectoral approaches in the training of future architects, offering a holistic stance of the history of architecture and an architecture that contributes to shaping critical thought and a thriving cultural life.

Michelangelo - Carmen C. Bambach 2017-11-05

Consummate painter, draftsman, sculptor, and architect, Michelangelo Buonarroti (1475–1564) was celebrated for his *disegno*, a term that embraces both drawing and conceptual design, which was considered in the Renaissance to be the foundation of all artistic disciplines. To his contemporary Giorgio Vasari, Michelangelo was “the divine draftsman and designer” whose work embodied the unity of the arts. Beautifully illustrated with more than 350 drawings, paintings, sculptures, and architectural views, this book establishes the

centrality of *disegno* to Michelangelo’s work. Carmen C. Bambach presents a comprehensive and engaging narrative of the artist’s long career in Florence and Rome, beginning with his training under the painter Domenico Ghirlandaio and the sculptor Bertoldo and ending with his seventeen-year appointment as chief architect of Saint Peter’s Basilica at the Vatican. The chapters relate Michelangelo’s compositional drawings, sketches, life studies, and full-scale cartoons to his major commissions—such as the ceiling frescoes and the Last Judgment in the Sistine Chapel, the church of San Lorenzo and its New Sacristy (Medici Chapel) in Florence, and Saint Peter’s—offering fresh insights into his creative process. Also explored are Michelangelo’s influential role as a master and teacher of *disegno*, his literary and spiritual interests, and the virtuoso drawings he made as gifts for intimate friends, such as the nobleman Tommaso de’ Cavalieri and Vittoria Colonna, the marchesa of Pescara. Complementing Bambach’s text are thematic essays by leading authorities on the art of Michelangelo. Meticulously researched, compellingly argued, and richly illustrated, this book is a major contribution to our understanding of this timeless artist.
